

## Understanding the Florida VPK Assessment Scores

### ASSESSMENT MEASURES

**Print Knowledge Measure** – assesses the child’s ability to recognize letters or words, and his/her knowledge of letter names (both upper and lower case) and the sounds they make.

**Phonological Awareness Measure** – is the awareness and manipulation of the different sounds in a word. The Phonological Awareness measure assesses the child’s ability to:

- blend (put together) a word if it is broken up into smaller sounds or syllables (e.g., /p/ + ig = pig)
- blend a compound word (e.g., dog + house = doghouse)
- recognize the remaining word when part of the stimulus word is taken away (e.g., campfire – camp = fire).

**Mathematics Measure** – assesses early numeracy skills across three different areas: counting skills, numerical relations skills, and arithmetic reasoning skills.

**Oral Language/Vocabulary Measure** – assesses a child’s expressive language and receptive language and targets the child’s knowledge of adjectives, verbs, verb tenses, prepositions, and nouns.
